### **VOTING IN THE NOVEMBER 5, 2019 GENERAL ELECTION TO BEGIN ON OCTOBER 8th**

(Cleveland) – The Board of Elections will be open for early in-person voting starting on October 8th for the November 5th General Election. The date also marks the opening of vote by mail.

Voting by mail is an easy and convenient way of casting a ballot from the comfort and privacy of your own home. To request a ballot application visit: [www.443vote.us](http://www.443vote.us), or call 216-443-VOTE (8683). They are also available at all public libraries.

Early voting at the Board of Elections is available for people who wish to vote in-person prior to the Election. The Board is open for early voting on the following dates:

Weekdays October 28th to November 1st	8:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m.

Monday, November 4th	8:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m.

The Board of Elections is located at 2925 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland.

#### **Voter Registration Deadline:**

The voter registration and change of address deadline for the November 5th General Election is Monday, October 7th, at 9:00 p.m. Voters who have not registered, moved, or have changed their name, must complete and return a voter registration card on, or before, the deadline.
